Dear Friends in Christ,

***'Jesus, Master, have pity on us!'*** (Luke 17: 13)

Next Monday marks World Homelessness Day. Goodness knows who decides the dates of such events – or even what we as a world will mark in this way, but as Christians, and for all humankind, this is an important issue and one not to be overlooked. For centuries, Christians have been at the forefront of working for the poor, the marginalised and the rejected. In doing so, we are following the teaching and example of Christ, who spent much of his time with people who were despised and rejected by society. As with the 10 lepers, Jesus made a point of showing them love.

Winchester Cathedral will be dedicating Evensong to World Homelessness Day this coming Monday evening, 10<sup>th</sup> October at 5.30pm. Do go along and support the work of The Beacon (formerly called Winchester Nightshelter).



Social commentator, Michael Josephson, writes: ‘Kindness is not a random act: Kindness, as a radical way of living, goes beyond doing little favours for people here and there. It asks us to be willing to show kindness to those who may not be kind to us, to have the courage of being authentically who we are and to make meaningful connections with others. That is not random at all – it is acting with purpose.’ As we reflect on the cause and effect of homelessness in the lives of people on our own streets as well as all over the world, we must surely conclude we have got our world values terribly wrong. We need to pay greater attention to the gifts and blessings of God and learn to share them, not hoard them. When we think of the homeless, we often say ‘*There but for the grace of God go I.*’ Never a truer word. I’ve had the privilege of volunteering at The Beacon, and realise how life events cause good people to spiral into poverty and homelessness, often through no fault of their own. God bless the work of The Beacon and the Trinity Centre and all of you who, through our churches or individually, support them in radical acts of kindness in Christ’s name.

I leave you with this prayer of gratitude, written by Christine Sine:


Thank you God

### Luke 17:11-19 - Jesus Heals Ten Men With Leprosy

Now on his way to Jerusalem, Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he was going into a village, ten men who had leprosy met him. They stood at a distance 13 and called out in a loud voice, 'Jesus, Master, have pity on us!'

When he saw them, he said, 'Go, show yourselves to the priests.' And as they went, they were cleansed.

One of them, when he saw he was healed, came back, praising God in a loud voice. He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him—and he was a Samaritan.

Jesus asked, 'Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine? Has no one returned to give praise to God except this foreigner?' Then he said to him, 'Rise and go; your faith has made you well.'
