

### The Washing of the Disciples' Feet


This Bible story can be found in John 13:1–17. It tells how Jesus taught the disciples (and us) how we are all equal and how he wanted people to care for one another.







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And Jesus taught them many things.







Walking in sandals on the filthy roads of Israel thousands of years ago made it very important that feet be washed before a meal. Imagine how dirty people's feet were after walking along dusty roads all day in the heat! People often ate sitting on the floor at low tables. Their feet were therefore very close to the food – and other people!

When Jesus rose from the table and began to wash the feet of the disciples (John 13:4), He was doing the work usually done by servants. The disciples must have been stunned, that Christ, their Lord and master, should wash the feet of His disciples, when it really should be their job to wash his!

## What Bible stories do you know that show that Jesus saw himself as a servant?

Peter was particularly uncomfortable with Jesus washing his feet, and, never being at a loss for words, Peter argued, "You shall never wash my feet!" Then Jesus said something that must have further shocked Peter: "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me" (John 13:8).


Peter, who loved Jesus, immediately asked to be washed all over!

When Jesus washed the disciples' feet, He told them (and us), "I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you" (John 13:15).

# Soapy art activity

What better way to make sure you remember this story than by making your very own soap.





Every time you wash, you will be reminded of what Jesus taught us by washing his friends' feet.

#### **Liquid Hand Soap Recipe**



#### You will need:

- 3 Cups Water, distilled if possible but this is not essential
- 2 tablespoons grated hard bar soap (soap with added moisturizes and cream like Dove will not work)
- 1/4 teaspoon washing soda
- 1 teaspoon vegetable Glycerin
- 20 To 50 Drops Essential Oils (Clove, Lemon, Cinnamon, Eucalyptus, Rosemary, Lavender Or Tea Tree all have Anti Fungal, anti bacterial Or anti viral properties)
- Plastic bowls
- Plastic spoons
- Old shampoo bottles or an empty soap dispenser

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#### Instructions

- 1. Put the water, grated soap, and washing soda in a small sauce pan over a medium heat. Heat until all of the ingredients have dissolved.
- 2. Remove the saucepan from the heat and add in the Glycerin and essential oils.
- 3. Pour the liquid soap into a container or bowl, allow it to sit at room temperature for 6 to 12 hours or overnight.
- 4. After the liquid soap has had time to rest, mix it up using a whisk or have some fun and use your hands!
- 5. Pour the finished liquid soap into their bottles.

You could design your own labels to stick onto the bottles.
