Sparsholt Traffic Meeting 29th October - Summary Report

Around 50 residents met in the Memorial Hall for a Residents' meeting to discuss traffic and related concerns/problems/issues, possible solutions and the extent of support for some of these solutions.

John Little chaired and opened the meeting thanking everyone for attending. He said that the meeting would be summarised in the Newsletter (this article) and that contributions from residents would be anonymous so that everyone could make their views known openly at the meeting. However, those parish councillors organising the meeting would be named.

There is funding available for some, if not all, feasible and supported solutions:

- HCC Highways funding was now available for immediate repairs including to the pinch points;
- approximately £25K is available in Parish Council reserves received from the community infrastructure levy on new developments completed in the village. More could be made available given sufficient support from residents.

The parish council group working on traffic issues consists of Sue Wood, Jon Walthoe and David Brown.

David was unable to attend, Sue took notes and Jon led the discussion at the meeting under the following headings.

Sparsholt Traffic - Problems?

Residents expressed road safety concerns across a range of traffic related issues throughout the whole parish.

Having pinch points with priority arrows was mentioned several times as well as having additional pinch points.

Equally, concern was raised that certain improvements could have unintended consequences of increasing traffic volumes or speeds.

All of the issues/solutions raised are summarised in the table at the end of the article.

20mph in the Village

There is a process for implementing changes to speed limits or other road classifications and one of the requirements is for broad support from the residents.

For a 20mph zone there needs to be sufficient frontage and a current average speed less than 26mph

For example: the stretch between Ham Green and The Plough is likely to meet the criteria. Although some residents spoke for the zone to reach Dean Lane this may not have sufficient frontage.

A range of views were expressed both for and against having a 20mph zone. Feedback from the nearby MIcheldever pilot were that driver speeds had increased.

On a show of hands a majority (34) were in favour of a 20mph zone Those (5) against tended to oppose on the grounds that reduced speed limits were not expected to be enforceable and yet may prove costly.

30mph in the village

The implementation of 30mph (rather than national speed limit) on approach roads to the village (Watley, Westley and Dean lanes) was discussed and whilst no show of hands was requested residents broadly spoke in favour.

Crab Wood

Concern was expressed about the damage to this SSSI and the need to preserve it.

A range of measures were discussed (summarised below).

Next Steps & Meeting Close

The Parish Council Traffic Working Group will prioritise actions that can make best use of the HCC Highways 'repairs' funding and develop proposals for improvements in line with the contributions at the meeting before arranging further consultations with the residents. If changes to speed limits are proposed a formal and thorough consultation will be required.

John Little closed the meeting just after 9pm and once again thanked everyone for attending.

Road Safety - Pedestrians and the Highway Code

Shortly after the meeting we received an email regarding Road Safety from one of the attendees. This is an extract from that email:

"I walk quite a lot on the roads around the village. It is quite alarming to see the number of people who insist on walking on the wrong side of the road, putting themselves at increased risk from traffic. It is common sense to walk on the right-hand side of the road facing on-coming traffic (if there is no footpath) as one can see approaching traffic well in advance and take whatever precautions are necessary to move to a place of safety, or wave to alert drivers of one's presence, well in advance of the vehicle passing. This is clearly emphasized in the Highway Code, Rules for Pedestrians that makes this very point quite clearly."

Here are the two relevant sections of the Highway Code:

- If there is no pavement, keep to the right-hand side of the road so that you can see oncoming traffic. You should take extra care and
 - be prepared to walk in single file, especially on narrow roads or in poor light
 - keep close to the side of the road.

It may be safer to cross the road well before a sharp right-hand bend so that oncoming traffic has a better chance of seeing you. Cross back after the bend.

• Help other road users to see you. Wear or carry something light-coloured, bright or fluorescent in poor daylight conditions. When it is dark, use reflective materials (e.g. armbands, sashes, waistcoats, jackets, footwear), which can be seen by drivers using headlights up to three times as far away as non-reflective materials. [Ed - especially with shorter daylight hours and in a village with no streetlights]

Hampshire County Councillor Report

Hampshire County Council has formally responded to the government's proposed changes to the National Planning Policy Framework. These changes could significantly increase the number of homes we need to provide locally, and we've raised several key concerns:

- Infrastructure Matters: It's crucial that any plans for new homes come with the necessary infrastructure, including schools, hospitals, GP surgeries, and pharmacies.
- Housing Targets: We believe the new housing targets for Hampshire are overly ambitious, with the proposed increase from 5,884 to 10,071 dwellings per year feeling excessive.
- Environmental Constraints: A significant portion of our county—45%—is covered by national parks and other environmental sensitive area, which limits land for housing delivery.
- Sustainable Transport: We welcome the shift towards active travel and sustainable transport planning.
- Health and Well-being: We're advocating for a stronger connection between climate change adaptation, health, and mental wellbeing, alongside addressing air pollution as a public health issue.
- Climate Change Policies: We support strengthened climate change policies and believe strategic planning is essential for managing its impacts.

Protecting Your Services

This month, Hampshire County Council's Cabinet made some important decisions aimed at reducing costs while keeping essential services intact. Many residents participated in our consultation on proposed savings, and I'm pleased to share that:

- School crossing patrols will remain in place.
- We will not be closing our Waste Recycling Centres or ending early contracts for homelessness grants.
- We will conduct a detailed review of Community Transport options

Police and Crime Commissioner



The Commissioner's new Police and Crime Plan 2024–2028

The Commissioner's new Police and Crime Plan 2024–2028 was formally approved by the Police and Crime Panel on 18th October and has officially launched today.

Titled 'More Police, Safer Streets 2', this plan builds on achievements from her first term with a focused strategy to address the crimes and issues most important to the public.

The Commissioner's priorities for the next four years are based on feedback from an extensive public consultation, with over 10,300 residents contributing their views to help shape policing in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight.

Key areas include increasing police visibility and engagement, tackling business and retail crime, addressing rural crime, targeting serious violence and its root causes, improving road safety, and reducing anti-social behaviour.

M3 Junction 9 Improvements Start

M3 junction 9 improvements – early works

We're planning to start our early works which will allow us to start main construction next year. The works will commence on Friday 11 October 2024, and will include:

Compound construction and vegetation management

We'll be carrying out necessary vegetation clearance to prepare for the site compound. We'll do this carefully, with thorough checks to protect wildlife. In some areas we'll plant new vegetation to support habitats for species like dormice. For the site compound, we'll begin installing services, foundations, and parking for offices and welfare facilities. The site entrance on the A272 Spitfire Link will also be improved for safer access. Most work will take place during daytime hours on weekdays, away from roads. Occasional night work will require lane closures, we'll issue advance signage with more information.

Archaeological surveys

From mid-October 2024, we'll be undertaking archaeological investigations in the areas being used for the site compound. This will involve some stripping and replacing of the top layers of soil to allow mapping. All work will take place during daytime hours on weekdays away from the road. Please note, the Transport Secretary has commissioned a review of the Department for Transports' spending portfolio, including current and future road schemes. While the review is ongoing, we're continuing with the preparatory works and remain committed to the project.


